- Emergency Obstetrics Core Privileges: Privileges to evaluate including performance of H&P, diagnose, manage, and surgically treat pregnant and post-partum patients admitted to UWHC. This does not permit admission for the primary purpose of obstetrical services, except when such admission is required by law in emergencies. These privileges include, but are not limited to, vaginal delivery; outlet forceps delivery; cesarean section; electronic fetal monitoring; D&C and/or uterine exploration and exploratory laparotomy for post-partum hemorrhage and supervision of residents, fellows and others in training.
- Special Competence - Assisted Reproduction: Privileges to admit, evaluate including performance of H&P, diagnose, consult and provide surgical or therapeutic interventions for women with infertility. These privileges include micro reanastomosis of the fallopian tubes; GIFT (Gamete intrafallopian tube transfer); invitro fertilization and embryo transfer, revision of complex congenital anomalies; ultrasound evaluation of developing follicles.

Professional Privileges-- New Applications

Kristin L. Doerfer, NP, UW Advance Practice Nurse

Department of Urology

- Urology NP Core Privileges: Privileges to promote health, prevent disease, assess/evaluate including performance of H & P, diagnose, consult and manage adolescent and adult patients with injuries or diseases of the genitourinary system, including pre- and postoperative care, in inpatient and outpatient settings in collaboration with physician members of the medical staff. These privileges also include ordering respiratory therapy and blood product ordering.

- General Surgery PA Professional Privileges: Under the direction and supervision of the responsible physician(s), the PA may perform the following, including but not limited to: Attending initially a patient of any age in any setting to obtain a medical history, perform a physical examination, and record and present pertinent data concerning the patient in a manner meaningful to the supervising physician; Performing, or assisting in performing, routine diagnostic studies as appropriate for a specific practice setting; Performing routine therapeutic procedures, including, but not limited to, injections, immunizations, and the suturing and care of wounds; Use of silver nitrate for chemical cautery; Instructing and counseling a patient on physical and mental health; including diet, disease, treatment and normal growth and development; Assisting the supervising physician in a hospital or facility by assisting in surgery, making patient rounds, recording patient progress notes, compiling and recording detailed narrative case summaries and accurately writing or executing orders under physician supervision; Assisting in the delivery of medical care by reviewing and monitoring treatment and therapy plans; Facilitating referrals to other

appropriate community healthcare facilities, agencies and resources. Assist in surgery to include, but not limited to, first assist on major or minor surgeries. These privileges also include ordering respiratory therapy.

- Prescriptive Authority

- Cardiothoracic Surgery Physician Assistant Core Professional Privileges: Under the direction and supervision of the responsible physician(s), the Physician Assistant may perform the following, including but not limited to: attending initially a patient of any age in any setting to obtain a medical history, perform a physical examination, and record and present pertinent data concerning the patient in a manner meaningful to the supervising physician; performing, or assisting in performing, routine diagnostic studies as appropriate for a specific practice setting; performing routine therapeutic procedures, including, but not limited to, injections, immunizations, suturing and care of wounds; insertion and removal of nasogastric tubes, insertion and removal of foley catheters, field infiltration of anesthetic solutions; perform incision and drainage of superficial abscesses; perform site checks after placement of catheters or pacemakers; perform venous and arterial punctures for blood sampling, cultures, and IV catheterizations, removal of arterial catheters, central venous catheters, chest tubes; removal of epicardial pacing wires; removal of intra-aortic balloon pumps; removal of temporary transvenous cardiac pacing catheters; instructing and counseling patients on physical and mental health; including diet, disease, treatment and normal growth and development; Assisting the supervising physician in surgery, making patient rounds, recording patient progress notes, compiling and recording detailed narrative case summaries, including operative notes as necessary and discharge summaries; order and the initial interpretation of diagnostic testing and therapeutic modalities, such as laboratory tests, medications, hemodynamic monitoring, treatments, x-ray, EKG, IV fluids, and electrolytes and writing or executing orders under the physician's supervision; Assisting in the delivery of medical care by reviewing and monitoring treatment and therapy plans; Facilitating referrals to other appropriate community healthcare facilities, agencies and resources.
